Public Savants (fill in from what you find)

1. Former Nebraska banker, served as FDIC vice-chairman and acting chairman.

2. Founder and director of three southwestern banks, he served as Federal Reserve Board governor.

3. Former ABA president [1979] from N.C., served on FDIC board.

4. Former Texas banker chaired FDIC in post-9/11 period.

5. First woman to serve as banker head of ABA [2004], she now serves on Federal Reserve Board of Governors.

6. Former Florida community banker who served as Federal Reserve Board member in 1979-82.

7. First-ever Comptroller of the Currency (1863-1865), he previously ran State Bank of Indiana.

8. Massachusetts banker served long stint on Federal Reserve Board, specialized in payment issues.

9. Former Florida community banker served as key Senate staffer, FDIC Vice-Chairman, and later as

Director of the Office of Thrift Supervision.

10. Detroit bank chairman who served U.S. post-WWII by helping to reorganize German economy. Known best for efforts as special ambassador to Japan and role in devising economic stabilization plan there.

11. Pennsylvania banker who chaired House Banking Committee for six Congresses while still keeping his bank job. Known for famous anti-branching law that bore his name.

12. Minnesota community banker served as ABA president [1986], key Senate staffer, Federal Reserve Board Governor, and head of PCAOB, the accounting regulator.

13. Famous Utah banker who went on to serve as both chair and vice-chairman of Federal Reserve Board. Fed building across from HQ bears his name.

14. Pre-Revolutionary War banker and merchant who personally financed key elements of the War. He served in various capacities, including "Agent of Marine" and "Superintendent of Finance." He was also one of the first Senators from Pennsylvania.

15. Former southern banker, served on Fed board, known for her interest in enterprise risk management and corporate governance—and soccer!
